Venice Biennale 2022: Key Painters from Cecilia Alemani's Headline Show

From disarming photorealism to a queer reinterpretation of Botticelli's Venus, explore Elephant's selection of the standout painters at the 59th Venice Biennale

Roberto Gil de Montes

Seashells, sandy beaches and tropical plants are found throughout Roberto Gil De Montes' paintings, giving a loose sense of dreamy delight. However, on closer inspection, darker elements reveal themselves, whether through a shadowy smudge that alludes to a ghostly figure, or the troubled stare of a man surrounded by a swirl of flowers and water.



Gil De Montes relocated to Los Angeles from Guadalajara in western Mexico as a

child and there was influenced by the creativity of the Chicano movement, as well as pre-Colombian and Huichol symbolism. The alluring palette and flattened perspective also betray references to the Mexican modernist canon. Erotic subversions are a running theme, particularly in El Pescador, which features a nude man standing on a clam shell in the style of Botticelli's Venus.
